WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE..

East Shore District Health
Department has many
shoreline beaches along
beautiful Long Island Sound,
enjoyed by many people.
Keeping these waters safe in
Branford and East Haven is the
responsibility of the
Environmental Health section.
We sample all our public
beaches every week between
Memorial Day and Labor Day to
make sure that our waters are
safe for everyone to enjoy.

Information is posted on our website and at the beach when the beach needs to be closed (for elevated bacteria levels).

The beach is resampled to determine if it is safe to opened up for public use.

New Tick on the Horizon

The Asian Long-Horn Tick is a new tick to our country. In other countries this tick can carry anaplasmosis, Erlychia, Babeseosis, Borrelia, and Heartland virus. None of those have been found in the ticks found in the U.S., yet. These ticks also don't attach to rodents. The State and the CDC are keeping a pulse on these new ticks.



If you see the Asian Long-Horn Tick or suspect it please contact the CT Agricultural Experiment Station (CAES). They want to keep testing these ticks to be monitor whether they are carrying any diseases ,like they do in other countries.

In the meantime remember to BLAST Lyme disease by:

- B Bath after coming in from being outside
- L- Look for ticks on your body, your children and your pets
- A Apply repellents. Ones with DEET work best. Look at the label.
- S Spray your yard. Have it sprayed by a licensed tick-management company. A single perimeter spray for tick control once in the Spring can reduce the number of ticks in your yard by up to 80 90%.
- T Treat you pets check your pets when they come indoors, have the vet vaccinate your pet, don't sleep with your pet, because ticks can crawl from them to you.

Ticks may be brought to the health department for analysis (we send to the CT AG Station) for a \$5 fee.
